Message from our Executive Director

Dear Friends:

Transitioning from August to September, from summer to autumn, is often compared to the developmental movement from the productive middle years to the more purposeful, selective and relational priorities emerging in the final phase of life. In a short time, God has provided me concrete experiences of summer abundance, autumn loss, and winter's cold.

The reality is we all have a terminal illness called *mortality*. My own mortality looms in the personal journey of losing three WVIS visionaries this year: Sr. Mary Pellicane, r.c. (3.17), Virginia H. Masters, first satellite founder (4.17), and Charles E. Boll, II, founding board member, faculty, supervisor, contemplative prayer leader, and director of Recovery efforts (5.25). Autumn provides a small window to prepare the soul soil for the next growing season.

I admire the legacy of these three visionaries and am committed to the spring abundance possible as I plant seeds of hope, encouragement, gratitude, forgiveness, and loving kindness. Help me as we embrace together the challenges of change beyond our control; the challenge of now dormant seeds rooting to emerge as colorful, vibrant foliage, but requiring the faith of unseen growth in winter.

We choose how to respond to change. WVIS offers retreat space to become aware of the ongoing wisdom of the Spirit and to hear the call to nurture, tend, and devote our changing lives to being blessing and to recognizing, with Abraham Heschel, that 'just to live is holy'.

Let's plant together, embrace our changing and uncertain future with deliberate choice: 'Choose life so that you and your descendants may live.' (Deut 30:19)



Experience the 19th Annotation Spiritual Exercises

Should you consider making the 19th Annotation Spiritual Exercises? Lisa Marengo, who recently completed the Exercises shares what she has come to understand.

The 19th Annotation is an invitation to journey with Christ to know that we are known and loved by God. On this journey, we encounter the power, love, and mercy of God in a deep and intimate way and experience the freedom and peace this encounter brings to our deepest selves. No longer strangers to ourselves, we are brought to the place where we touch and know our foundation in Christ.

We embark on a process of getting "right" with God. Without judgment, we are guided by the light of God's mercy and love to awareness that opens our vision to a loving and joyous relationship with God and ourselves. From this foundation we are invited into loving relationships with others. We cannot more fully honor others until we honor ourselves by coming to know that we are whole and full and beautiful in the loving and merciful sight of God.

As our vision is opened, we become more deeply aware of the gentle movements of the Spirit within us. We come to experience God in the Personal, moving from conflict and constraint to deepening understanding and acceptance, leading to inner peace. Led by the Spirit, we glimpse our inner, most authentic selves and encounter God at our inner altar where God's grace clears away the debris that has hidden its presence in our lives. The work is deep and not always easy. But this is the rewarding work of healing, the deep, miraculous work of the hand of God in our lives, leading us to fullness and joy. We come to know that we are loved and honored and esteemed beyond measure. Through our journey we are being transformed from strangers and sojourners to apostles and prophets, beloved children of God.

Change is the only constant ~Heraclitus

The old saying about change seems especially apt during this pandemic. The upheaval in our social, political, spiritual, and emotional lives takes a steep toll. My grandmother spoke of the Influenza Epidemic of 1918. Too many family members and friends were taken from us at the time. Trauma was everywhere.

In the midst of the sea of changes all around, I read about our Celtic ancestors. St Aidan began as Jesus did by tending to the sick and the dying. He led his monks in feeding the hungry and tending to the poor. Literacy was essential to the worship of God. Responding to human need was the fixed North Star for our ancestors in faith. All the while they were constant in prayer, unmovable and unshakable in faith through the trauma they faced.

Were they haunted by doubts? Did they wonder why God seemed to abandon them time and again at the hands of Viking swords? Of course they did. But then, they would see someone sick or poor and the old instincts kicked in. Somehow God makes provision for us out of our poverty. By some miracle here we are still seeking to serve those in need.

The pandemic has taught us a great deal. The spiritual hunger among those we serve is especially acute. Meanwhile there are the sick and dying, the hungry, and of course there are prayers to be said, and the Story of God to be told. It rejoices the heart that we have this work to do.

I can sense Sr. Pellicane's presence near WVIS' front door waiting for the return of the women of the Thursday night AA group. Her arms are still outstretched with a welcoming hug. Charlie continues to faithfully attend his many AA meeting and remains especially fond of the 11th Step Prayer and Meditation Group. He prays with us and for us.

I am happy to announce the result of our shared prayer. Beginning last month (July 2021), members of the Celebrate the Spirit planning group began carrying the message to people in early recovery at St. Francis Hospital. God keeps working miracles. Please keep us in

your prayers. That will help our team to let go and let God.

Continuing Professional Development (CPD)

WVIS' Continuing Professional Development (CPD) Annual Weekend for all WVIS Spiritual Directors and Graduates is scheduled for *Friday, October 15th and Saturday, October 16th.* Watch your email or visit the WVIS website for updates.

Governor's Service Awards Honor Outstanding West Virginians

Each year the Governor's Service Awards honor individuals and groups in West Virginia who roll up their sleeves to solve community problems in innovative ways. The West Virginia Institute for Spirituality (WVIS) has three remarkable women who have been honored with this distinguished award.

Sr. Mary Pellicane, rc.: As a Cenacle sister, her spiritual journey took her from Boston to New Zealand, Pittsburgh to Rome, Lower Manhattan to Rochester, New York. Then, ultimately, to a final landing in West Virginia's capital city. Over the years, streams of people sought her for spiritual direction and guidance through the turmoil and confusion of life in the uncloistered, unruly world. "I ended up listening to people my entire lifetime," Sr. Pellicane said. In that listening, in the long hours of quiet in retreat houses, she found her calling.

Ardath Stanton Francke: WVIS moved to its current location in December 2002. In 2003, discussions began regarding building a hermitage on the WVIS grounds to provide a private space for silent retreats. Under the leadership of 2004 WVIS Board President, Ardath S. Francke, that dream became a reality and on November 25, 2006, WVIS hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony and dedication of the Ardath S. Francke Hermitage! Countless retreatants have reaped the benefits of making their silent, directed retreat in this peaceful Hermitage.

Paula Francke Osborne: Like Mother, like daughter! What are the chances of both a mother and daughter receiving the same prestigious award? In this case, it is not surprising. They are cut from the same cloth: loving, kind, generous, enthusiastic, and persevering in their efforts to bring about good for others. Paula completed her training for the ministry of spiritual direction in 2009. In December 2020, she was commissioned as an Associate Director of Programming for the WVIS satellite she coordinates in Berkeley Springs, WV. In this role, Paula develops and leads spiritual direction programs in her geographic region to support the mission and vision of WVIS.

WVIS Offers Programs both Live and via Zoom

The West Virginia Institute For Spirituality is dedicated to providing space and opportunities for deepening mindfulness, prayer practice, interior peace, and for integrating moral and ethical values. Here are some of the Fall 2021 offerings:

Spiritual Direction Training: The deadline to be part of this year's spiritual direction training class has been extended to August 21st. There are a total of 9 training sessions over the course of three semesters. Tuition is \$1,100 per semester.

Certificate in Facilitating Ignatian Retreats and Offering Group Direction programs: WVIS has put together this NEW opportunity for those who have been trained in other programs and would like to become certified to offer Ignatian Directed Retreats and Group Direction Programs. Tuition is \$675 for this program.

The Love Challenge: This program, being offered in collaboration with Rev. Michael Poke, Sr., Pastor at St. Paul Missionary Baptist Church, will be held both in person (at Pastor Poke's church) and via Zoom. The workshop endeavors to create a safe environment for reflection on racial bias. It will cover methods to address racism, hate and violence as well as the development of a plan to heal the cultural divisions in local communities.
