Dear WVIS Community,

You may have seen this information in an email from WVIS in late September. I shared it at that time as I didn't want to delay bringing you up to date with some of the happenings at WVIS. For those of you on the email list as well as those of you who are not, let me share the latest news with you.



On Sunday, July 28th Sr. Carole experienced a stroke and was hospitalized in one of the Charleston Hospitals. She was discharged after a few days and spent time recuperating at WVIS and received home health care. When it became apparent she needed further medical treatment, she was hospitalized again. Sr. Carole has been hospitalized since that time receiving care and therapy.

In early October, Sr. Carole was transferred to another center where her care will continue. Prior to leaving Charleston for further rehab in Pennsylvania, Sr. Carole was walking with assistance, eating on her own and looking forward to reading her mail every day. Her mind is sharp! Her voice is a whisper. I ask you to please continue to pray for: Sr. Carole, her family, the WVIS Staff, Faculty, and community.

If you live in the Allison Park area and feel you might want to visit Sr. Carole, please be sure to check with the rehab facility first. As I write this, they have severely limited visits as she begins her ongoing therapy there.

WVIS Celebrates the First Annual Community Retreat

Last November WVIS' Associate Ministry Directors (aka Satellites) were reflecting on their fall retreat day which has been offered since 2021. Every year attendees express their awe in the power of God in our community. Organizers (Cindy Neely, Sr. Ritamary Schulz and Liz Deal) wondered, "How could more people experience this?" Sister Carole suggested inviting all WVIS Associate Spiritual Directors and Interns and changing the name to Annual WVIS Community Retreat. Sister Molly declared it an EXCELLENT idea!

In September, 25 spiritual directors, including six incoming Interns, came together on Zoom to meditate on who we are and what we do as individuals and as WVIS Spiritual Directors. The day flowed gently through three rounds each beginning with excepts from Schemel's *Beyond Individuation to Discipleship*. We used the Ignatian model articulating a grace and offering Scripture in reflecting on our individual identities and relationship with God, how we are called to respond to God's call in our lives, and, finally, who we really are by surfacing our "Name of Grace."

Here are some of the comments shared in the evaluations, "As a first timer, I really enjoyed and was inspired by everything today." "What a great and uplifting day!" "It was a very moving and enlightening experience." We are definitely planning for a repetition next year!

Cenacle Memories

In preparation for the 25th Anniversary Newsletters, I had the pleasure of being introduced to Diane Bader, an early "spiritual director" and supporter of the Cenacle Retreat House during the 1980's. Diane hasn't lived in Charleston for over 35 years, but her memories of that time were clear and her stories were familiar and heartwarming.

She describes The Cenacle as a "virtual oasis in the middle of Charleston," where she often spent many happy hours. The Cenacle had a tiny chapel for prayer and meditation; and Sr. Mary Pellicane listened as a spiritual director with great compassion, sharing her profound wisdom.

The kitchen was cared for by Sr. Anna. It was a welcoming and safe haven for Diane's children and

others who would wait there after school. Sr. Anna would assign them chores and give them cookies while she supervised their homework.

Diane often helped with retreats and remembered one instance where she found and comforted a participant in tears. The woman later sent Diane a thank you letter and expressed the realization that she "never knew so much love existed in the world." Diane later found that this woman was a prisoner from the women's prison in Alderson, WV who were sometime allowed to attend.

There were also the humorous memories like her recollection of Sr. Dorothy (who was always full of wonderful funny stories) as the "bag lady" of

Celebrating 150 Years in the United States

On Thursday, September 5, 2024 Sr. Molly Maloney, O.S.F. and Sr. Mary Irene Sorber, S.C.C., welcomed members of Sr. Molly's community, the Sisters of

St. Francis of Stella Niagara, NY, to WVIS. The community is celebrating 150 years of ministry in the United States. In 1874, four sisters, "women of courage", crossed a threshold, leaving their beloved homeland of Germany to sail to the United States, arriving in New York on the 5th of June 1874.


Early Friday morning, September 6, Provincial Councilor, Sr. Regina Snyder and Sisters Diane Bernbeck, Maureen Harris, Frances Kirtley, Molly Maloney, and Patricia McMahon were invited to return to the schools. They participated in a prayer service with the Juniors and Seniors of Charleston Catholic

High School and were given a tour of Sacred Heart Grade School. A Mass of Thanksgiving was celebrated on Saturday, September 7 at the Basilica of the Co-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart.



The sisters' ministry of education began in Charleston in 1903. They taught at Sacred Heart Grade School, St Anthony Grade School, and Charleston Catholic High School. Still residing in Charleston are Sr. Molly and Sr. Frances. Sr. Molly has served as a spiritual director at WVIS since 2002. Sr. Frances established the Pastoral Care Department at the Charleston Area Medical Center (CAMC) in 1980 and since her retirement continues to serve at CAMC as a volunteer. Both sisters are Charlestonians and are most grateful to continue a Franciscan presence in their active ministries and serve in the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston.

There were many more stories told in the hour I spent with Diane, and it was obvious in her remembrances there was an atmosphere of care, love, and compassion in the Cenacle during those early years. And as I listened, I couldn't help thinking how little things had changed in the heart of what was done then and what is done at WVIS now. Let us continue the work in the same spirit it all began.

When I was asked to prepare a reflection for the Celebration Booklet in honor of WVIS' 25th anniversary, I chose the prayer of Saint Anselm of Canterbury. I am inviting everyone to pray this prayer daily.

Since my youth, this prayer has inspired me because it captures, from my perspective, the intricacies of the spiritual journey. It focuses where my heart is, namely, in the art and discipline of teaching and being taught. As a teacher, being taught elicits profound challenges. Being taught requires openness to the teacher and to the messages. It requires trust, flexibility, a listening heart and the ability to hear, interpret and discern how to implement the instruction. Being taught by God is lifelong.

The yearning expressed in this prayer: teach my heart when, where, and how to seek You after I have done all that I could do. Help me to recognize, to love, to appreciate and enjoy the fact that I find You by loving, love You in finding You. This mystery of Providence embodies the union with the Mystery of God that spans the spiritual nights of doubt, fear, unknowing and the consolations eye has not seen. God who is before me and present in each and everything is Shekinah, God, Emmanuel.

PRAYER of SAINT ANSELM

Teach my heart this day where and how to find you.

You have made me and re-made me, and you have bestowed on me all the good things I possess, and still I do not know you. I have not yet done that for which I was made.

Teach me to seek you, For I cannot seek you unless you teach me, or find you unless you show yourself to me.

> Let me seek you in my desire let me desire you in my seeking. Let me find you by loving you; let me love you where I find you.
