Sister Carole Riley entered the Sisters of Divine Providence on September 6, 1959, giving up a promising future as a classical pianist. In a 2010 interview she said that as a



young novice she had set a goal for herself "to work and be a saint who makes a difference in people's lives, bringing them closer to Christ and heaven." She certainly achieved that goal. During her years at WVIS Sister Carole directed hundreds of individual and group retreats (at the Retreat house and across the world), was a spiritual director to many, taught classes in the spiritual direction training program, counseled, made videos and CD's of programs she led. Sister Carole worked hard, prayed always, and was generous with time and talent to the end of her life. While Sister Carole is no longer with us, her spirit survives in those she touched with her music and her ministry.

Over the years she was like a "Mighty Oak" – standing proudly in her calling as one of God's faithful servants. Let us remember that this "Mighty Oak" dropped and planted many acorn seeds along her pathway of life. The work of Jesus Christ will continue to sprout in the seeds she has planted.

PRAYER of SAINT ANSELM



Reflection

Reflection

This comforting thought reminds us that, like the setting sun, life is a cycle of endings and beginnings.
