Message from our Board President

Dear WVIS Community,

We are not the only creatures of habit. We are not the only ones that do something a certain way. Read on:

If you put a *buzzard* in a pen that is 6 feet by 8 feet and is entirely open at the top, the bird, in spite of its ability to fly, will be an absolute prisoner. The reason is that a buzzard always begins a flight from the ground with a run of 10 to 12 feet. Without space to run, as is its habit, it will not even attempt to fly but will remain a prisoner for life in a small jail with no top.

The ordinary *bat* that flies around at night, a remarkably nimble creature in the air, cannot take off from a level place. If it is placed on the floor or flat surface, all it can do is shuffle about helplessly and, no doubt, painfully, until it reaches some slight elevation from which it can throw itself into the air. Then, at once, it takes off.

A *bumblebee*, if dropped into an open tumbler, will be there until it dies, unless it is taken out. It never sees the means of escape at the top but persists in trying to find some way out through the sides near the bottom. It will seek a way where none exists, until it completely destroys itself.

In many ways we are like the buzzard, bat, and bumblebee. We struggle about with our problems and frustrations – living in the past and trapped by what was. We at times have forgotten that Almighty God has given us the ability to look up! The answer is always above! Our hope always comes from above.

How simple the answer can be. But it takes a lifetime to learn and remember. As we continue into this New Year, it is good to remember that we can always look up. We were created with free will and yes, this at times gets us into trouble...when we make wrong choices. Yes, God created us this way...but we were also created with a mind and with the ability to make responsible decisions. We are always in need of grace and forgiveness. This grace and forgiveness comes through the life and love of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior.

May we always look up!

We stand in silence as snowflakes lit by street lights, pillow silently into the slow-moving creek in the valley below us.

The driver nearest me whispers in a husky, awe-filled voice, "Bout as close to heaven as we're gonna get, don'tcha think?" "I do," I say with a smile. The drivers huddle closer. "Listen, lady," one of them says. "You follow us, and we'll keep you safe. These mountain roads can get real icy real fast, and it's pitch dark. I seen yur Georgia license."

The drivers climb into their cabs like a well-rehearsed line of Rockette dancers. One of them reassures me, "Consider us yur angels, lady, keepin' you safe to wherever yur goin'." He thinks for a moment, "and where would that be?"

"Charleston," I shout as I maneuver my car between the two last trucks. Accompanied by strangers along a deserted highway to Almost Heaven, I sing at the top of my lungs, grateful for 18-wheeler angels.

WVIS Advent Retreat: Giving Birth to God

At this year's Advent Retreat, Sr. Cheryl Clemons, OSU, reminded us that "the incarnation is not simply remembering an event that happened more than 2000 years ago; we are all called to be mothers of God, for God is always needing to be born."

What was so powerful and so different about this year's retreat was going through the four moments of giving birth—moments Mary would have experienced and moments that each of us experiences as we seek to bring Christ's light into the world. These are:

- Impregnation with the Holy Spirit
- · Gestation of God within one's body and soul
- Stretching and the agony of giving birth
- · Nurturing an infant into adulthood

Like Mary, we too can allow ourselves to be filled with the Holy Spirit. Through prayer, retreats, and spiritual direction, we invite God to fill us and we say yes to the gestation process that lets God grow within us as God fills us with God's self. This is not always easy, as bringing God into the world often feels countercultural. Jesus was countercultural too. So there is a stretching of ourselves as we continue on our journey, to remain faithful to our yes, even when it is hard or painful and those around us and maybe those in our own families do not understand.
